New York, NY—On **Sunday, February 22 at 2:30 p.m.**, join community choirs and special guest artists for the stirring and powerful concert *Shirei Teva: Jewish Choirs Celebrate Nature Through Music* at the **Museum of Jewish Heritage—A Living Memorial to the Holocaust**. Performers include *Shir Chadash* and *Shirei Chesed* choirs conducted by **Cantor Natasha J. Hirschhorn**; *Congregation Beth Simchat Torah Choir* with **Joyce Rosenzweig** and **Cantor David Berger**; and *Kolot Halev Choir* from Chevy Chase, Maryland conducted by **Hazzan Dr. Ramon Tasat**. About the Museum of Jewish Heritage

The Museum's three-floor Core Exhibition educates people of all ages and backgrounds about the rich tapestry of Jewish life over the past century—before, during, and after the Holocaust. Special exhibitions include *Woman of Letters: Irène Némirovsky and Suite Française*, on view through March 22 and *The Shooting of Jews in Ukraine: Holocaust by Bullets*, on view through March 15. The Museum offers visitors a vibrant public program schedule in its Edmond J. Safra Hall. It is also home to Andy Goldsworthy's memorial *Garden of Stones*, as well as James Carpenter's *Reflection Passage*, Gift of The Gruss Lipper Foundation.
