**Contemporary Dreidels**— Brushed metal dreidels, available in three styles: red and yellow, light blue, and dark blue. \$40.

**Hanukkah Serving Platter** — Hand-painted, ceramic plate with silver accents. Perfect for latkes or gelt. Not for microwave or dishwasher. \$30.

**Enamel Tulip Menorah** — Assorted colors with ladybug accents. \$220.

**Spode Menorah** — Ceramic painted flower and vine motif menorah. This design is based on historic Judaic manuscripts from the 1880s. \$140.

### **About the Museum**

The Museum's three-floor Core Exhibition educates people of all ages and backgrounds about the rich tapestry of Jewish life over the past century—before, during, and after the Holocaust. Special exhibitions include *Beyond Swastika and Jim Crow: Jewish Refugee Scholars at Black Colleges*, on view through January 4 and *The Morgenthau: A Legacy of Service*, opening November 16. *Keeping History Center*, a new, interactive visitor experience, opens on November 6.
